

### CDC awards \$4.3M to UW HIPRC for Injury

**Prevention Research >>** 

**The HIPRC has received a \$4.3 million grant** from the CDC <u>to advance research addressing critical public health challenges</u>. The funding will support research on opioid overdose prevention, adverse child experiences, school violence prevention, and older adult falls.

The grant will also support investigators conducting research, training of new injury-prevention specialists, and community-guided policies, programs, and public outreach.

### Dr. Abe Bergman honored with Medal of Merit >>

**Dr. Abe Bergman**, one of the HIPRC's founding directors, was posthumously honored with Washington's Medal of Merit. The award, presented in a ceremony at the Washington State Capitol by Governor Jay Inslee, Lieutenant Governor Denny Heck, and Chief Justice Steven C. González, recognized his significant contributions to public health, particularly in child advocacy and injury prevention. Dr. Bergman's career includes pioneering work in pediatrics and creating impactful policies that have improved the health and safety of children statewide and beyond. This prestigious recognition highlights his enduring legacy and dedication to public service through healthcare innovation and advocacy.

### Research

#### Core Achievements:

**The HIPRC Research Core** is dedicated to leading and supporting injury and violence prevention research. We join our communities in this endeavor, including the University of Washington, local, state, and regional partners, and colleagues across the country and around the world. Research spans the continuum of injury prevention and response. Our work includes epidemiological research to determine injury causes and risk factors. When injury occurs, we study the spectrum of acute, rehabilitation, and long-term recovery care in the hospital, home, and community. We are actively engaged in expanding our capacity in both innovative qualitative and quantitative approaches, as well as applying community-engaged and equity-informed research methods.

### Core *Highlights*:

## Nationwide Evaluation of Suicide Prevention Training Programs for Healthcare Professionals >>

This project is a nationwide evaluation and comprehensive assessment of suicide prevention training programs for healthcare professionals.

In June, the team presented the project and the early findings at the Society for Epidemiologic Research's Annual Meeting in Austin, Texas.

### Advancing Health Equity: A Framework for Public Health Researchers >>

A new report published this year in <u>the journal Injury Prevention</u> reviews "The Continuum of Health Equity Practice & Science," a framework designed to help public health researchers and practitioners focus on health equity. Developed through surveys and research reviews, the continuum outlines seven key steps for addressing systemic inequities such as identifying health disparities, engaging communities, and implementing equity-focused science.

This tool can help guide public health researchers and practitioners in conceptualizing and applying health equity strategies. It can also uncover gaps in current approaches, improve equity-focused methodologies, and enhance public health outcomes. The Continuum aims to make health equity clearer and more actionable for public health efforts. *This work was part of HIPRC trainee, Hannah Scheuer's, MSW, LICSW, summer 2023 internship with the CDC.*

### Core Highlights:

# Preventing Falls in Long-Term Care Facilities >>

Older adults living in long-term care facilities (LTCFs) face a higher risk for falls than those living independently in the community. As part of a CDC-funded research study, three papers were published this year in the journals, Injury Prevention and JAMDA. The first paper focuses on identifying evidence-based individual resident level interventions to foster a proactive approach to reducing fall risks. The second paper examines the evidence base for facility-specific fall prevention plans through collaboration with care teams and leveraging evidence-based strategies. The third paper identifies effective strategies for implementing evidence-based interventions in LTCFs. Together, these findings offer a robust framework for enhancing safety and care quality in long-term care settings. The studies also emphasize innovative fall prevention strategies in LTCFs and the need for system-wide interventions tailored to unique facility environments.

### **EQUIP—Equity in Injury Prevention >>**

In 2024, King County, WA, faced a significant challenge with over 16,000 individuals experiencing homelessness (King County Regional Homeless Authority), a population at heightened risk for traumatic injuries, including severe burns. To address this issue, a collaborative research project, led by HIPRC Burn Section Leader and UW Medicine Regional Burn Center director Barclay Stewart, MD, and Caitlin Orton, MPH, and the King County Regional Homelessness Authority aimed to evaluate burn injury prevention education tailored for people experiencing homelessness (PEH).

The newly developed prevention education resource, How to Safely Start a Fire, was consumer tested with PEH to assess for clarity, applicability, and utility using the Model System Knowledge Translation Center's Consumer Testing Toolkit and the Patient Education Materials Assessment Tool (PEMAT) standards. Community outreach workers helped the research team identify participants living in different areas within Seattle. This work was conducted with the valuable support of 2024 HIPRC INISIGHT Summer Research Program Intern, Anna Hayashizaki.

In collaboration with the HIPRC's Research and Outreach Cores, the Training & Education Core strives to develop technically adept researchers who are responsive to community needs and priorities.

### Core Highlights:

### INSIGHT Programs: Empowering Students Nationwide >>

In 2024, the HIPRC's three INSIGHT Programs increased national engagement: the INSIGHT **Summer Research** Program's applicant pool had over 850 applicants, with 15 accepted interns. Our virtual, robust INSIGHT **High School** Program included 47 students. In addition, our virtual extension program, **INSIGHT REACH**, included over 270 students!

Collectively, the HIPRC's INSIGHT Programs are supported by the HIPRC faculty and staff, in addition to researchers and health professionals from within and outside the University of Washington who provide state-of-the-art training and education in areas of injury and violence prevention.

# INSIGHT Alum Collabs w/ HIPRC to Promote Active Transportation Safety >>

Xu, collaborated with HIPRC researchers on a Transportation Safety Study to help highlight the number of bicycle and escooter related injuries in Seattle.

Xu created two facts sheets using escooter and bicycle injury data from UW Medicine and Harborview Medical Center's Trauma Database. The fact sheets provide a brief overview of the injuries, hospital locations where patients were treated, PLUS preventative measures. The fact sheets were designed to help prevent injuries by educating the public on best practices and safety tips.

#### T-32 Program >>

The Department of Pediatrics at the UW School of Medicine and the HIPRC Training & Education Core, is proud to have the only National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD) funded Pediatric Injury T-32 Program, which provides funding to train pediatric injury and violence prevention researchers. The HIPRC's 2024 T-32 Post-Doctoral Scholars include: Krista Neumann, Social Determinants of Family Violence Outcomes.

# 2024 HIPRC Dr. Frederick P. Rivara Endowment Awarded >>

The HIPRC awarded Premgamon Kuntajak, MS, RN, AGPCNP-BC, the 2024 Endowment for her project titled, "Psychological Resilience among Older Adults following Mild-Moderate Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI): A Concurrent Explanatory Mixed Methods Study." This award provides resources to graduate students

and postdoctoral trainee investigators looking to conduct an injury-related project that will advance knowledge of injury prevention, treatment, or recovery and help with career advancement.

#### YOUTH-Reach >>

The Youth-Rural Education and Careers in Healthcare (Youth-REACH) Program, developed by the HIPRC, aims to empower rural youth in the WWAMI region for college and healthcare careers. The program, which addresses educational gaps by providing scholarships for hands-on healthcare training, dedicated mentorship, career exploration opportunities, and community engagement will connect students with local healthcare networks. Youth-REACH offers rural students a pathway to explore healthcare careers, experience university life through virtual programs, and gain valuable insights into higher education and professional development. The program will kick off in 2025. This work was supported in part by foundry10.

### Outreach

#### Core Achievements:

**The <u>HIPRC Outreach Core</u>** focuses on innovative and effective communication, equity, and impact in injury and violence prevention. The Core collaborates with the HIPRC researchers and the Research and Training & Education Cores to support the translation of research to practice. Center researchers collaborate with policy experts and community partners to conduct and disseminate research findings that aim to prevent injuries and violence. Using best practices from health education, behavioral science, social marketing, and communication, we support research that is responsive to community injury and violence prevention priorities. In partnership with the Community Advisory Board, we respectfully collaborate with our community partners and are responsive to their priorities.


### Core *Highlights*:

### **Equity in Aquatic Programming >>**

The HIPRC launched its Equity in Aquatic Programming Guide, a groundbreaking resource designed to address disparities in access to aquatic activities and drowning prevention programs. Designed to support community organizations, the guide offers culturally relevant tools, including comprehensive instructions, case studies, and best practices, to develop inclusive and accessible programming for underrepresented populations.

This guide is the result of extensive research, interviews, and work from the Seattle Drowning Collaborative, a group comprised of the <u>UW HIPRC</u>, <u>Public Health-Seattle & King County</u>, <u>Seattle Children's</u>, and <u>SPLASHForward</u>. The Seattle Drowning Collaborative met with experts in the field of aquatic safety and inclusivity and designed this guide to be a valuable resource for aquatic program coordinators, educators, and policymakers. This initiative reflects HIPRC's commitment to advancing health equity and ensuring safety across all communities.

### Core Highlights:

### 3rd Annual Outreach Learning Series >>

The HIPRC's Outreach Core held its **third annual** "Outreach Learning Series: Engaging High School Students in Injury & Violence Prevention Careers." The event hosted about forty 11th-12th grade students and teachers from Rainier Beach and Franklin High School at the Harborview Research & Training Building Auditorium.

Various hands-on stations were set up for students to learn about different careers in injury and violence prevention. Students were given a mock crisis scenario and were taught the steps taken both pre-hospital and at a hospital and trauma center to manage and then rehabilitate a gunshot wound patient. The focus of the Learning Series Event was to introduce and teach high school students about potential careers in health care. This event provided a particular focus on careers that students might encounter at a Level 1 Trauma Center with an injury and violence prevention lens.

### Injury & Violence Prevention Events >>

The HIPRC's Outreach Core collaborated with community partners to support several local safety and injury prevention initiatives over the summer to help spread awareness about drowning & pedestrian safety.

We partnered with Harborview Medical Center's Outreach Team at the <u>City of Des Moines'</u> <u>Community Block Party</u>. With a focus on pedestrian safety, we provided education and resources to families on how to stay safe while walking in and around busy streets. One of the highlights was our interactive pedestrian safety activity, where we quizzed children and their parents on injury violence prevention topics such as road safety rules.

The HIPRC proudly sponsored MINDFest 2024 in Skagit Valley. The event held an inspiring, informative, and inclusive environment for community members to engage in meaningful dialogue about mental health. Its purpose was to connect individuals with essential resources and services to support their well-being. The HIPRC staff contributed by enhancing language accessibility and offering valuable resources and activities to attendees of all ages. Additionally, we joined Seattle Children's Hospital at the **Federal Way Parks and Recreation Kids Day** to distribute information to parents on drowning prevention and where to access life jackets in the community.
